Case V Series Tractor Thunder Models, 1/35th Scale


Boys! As most of you know, I always look for out of the normal subjects to model. This kit is definitely one of them. It's a case "V' series farm tractor in 1/35th scale, by a relative newcomer, Thunder Models. It seems to be Chinese in origin. Take a look at the pics to see the contents. My comments on this kit will be simple. Very Very nice. The molds are slide type and have great detail and low parts count, just like the real tractor.

This kit was produced for a few reasons, I think, mostly that they can be built both civilian and military. The armed services used them all over the world during the war years. Farmers used them and there are still

man y in use today, with many in newly restored condition.

The kit is laid out on 2 main sprues of plastic, 4 very nice vinyl tires, and a decal sheet with both US Army and Civilian Markings. Also included is a painting guide with color photos. One OD Green, the Other Case orange which is obtainable in many places even Home Depot. The instructions are clear.

When building, remember to tweak the fan blade ends 45 degrees or no air to the cooling system. The included small brass sheet included makes up, the floorboards, set post assembly, and dashboard. If you are going to wire this kit you only need a few strands just








like the real one!


Building the Glencoe Thor Missile

I have been recovering in the past few months from a case of "modelers burnout". Complex vacuform builds, taking three or four months to complete have been taking a toll on my modeling spirit. I looked back fondly at the much simpler models I built as a kid and the simple enjoyment I found in simply painting and gluing the parts together. There was no photo-etched parts to worry about, no worry about "silvering" decals, no perfect paint scheme, you just built the model.







Lately I've been building reissues of vintage kits and have found the simple joys of building a model over the course of a weekend. In this spirit I'd like to tell you about my build of the Glencoe Thor missile.

This kit was first issued by Adams Model in 1958 and this is the first reissue since that date. The original "Adams Action Model 1958" is still molded on the reverse of one of the parts. I've taken a picture of this marking and hope it comes out in the article. The kit comes in two plastic bags, the first contains the Thor missile comprising eight parts of white plastic, the second contains the launch pad comprising about thirty parts of dark gray plastic. You also get some figures, two guys in protective suits, a technician and an officer directing the servicing of the missile.

The box art is an exact copy of the old Adams artwork and really carries the spirit of late 1950's rocket technology. That artwork made kids buy models back in the day and it still works for me today. The box states the model

is to 1/87th HO scale but it looks closer to 1/72 scale. There is amazingly little flash on the parts considering the age of the molds.

Now let's get the "historical inaccuracies" out of the way. Yes, the Thor was never launched from White Sands New Mexico, nor did it use the launch pad supplied with the kit. In fact Adams used the launch pad from their Vanguard model (recently reissued by Glencoe) in the Thor kit to cut costs. And you thought Hasagawa was the first to repackage models! Yes, I know the launch pad railings are way over scale and should be replaced but WHO CARES! Let's just build the model and have a little fun.

The Thor missile went together in about fifteen minutes. The fit of the parts rivaled those of modern kits with no filler needed. Just a light sanding of the seams and that was it. The tail fin and nose cone fits were perfect requiring no filling at all. I primed the Thor with automotive primer and then a final coat coat of Krylon Gloss Brilliant White. Glencoe had done a very good job



with the decals, surprisingly there's a lot for a missile, and they went on without a hitch. I've read that the markings are not accurate but they looked just fine to me and this was a fun build so who the devil cares. After drying overnight the Thor was given a top







coat of Krylon Clear Gloss and that was it! I spent about four working hours total on assembling the Thor. Now on to the launch pad.

The "inaccurate" launch pad was a joy to build. The only problem was the mold lines on the "over scale" railings which had to be removed. You really had to follow the instructions and build in the steps indicated or you could not access portions of the launch pad. There are a series of water pipes and associated valves, used for cooling that are part of the kit. I found that these parts were "keyed" to prevent inadvertent assembly in the wrong position. This "keying" was also used on the launch pad stairs and railings. Nice touch for an almost sixty year old kit and the fit was superb.

The launch pad was painted in dark grey automotive primer, with certain subassemblies like the blast trough and water pipes in flat black. As per the instructions the water pipe valves were painted red.....I mean what other color would you use for a water valve on a missile launch pad? Every kid in the 50's would automatically know it had to be red! The launch pad also had an emergency wash sink, nicely molded, in the event a technician got rocket fuel on him. Additional items on the launch pad were four

flood lights and a hand cranked hoist. The flood light bodies were painted flat aluminum with the lens portion old fashioned Testors Silver over coated with Tamiya clear. And yes it still takes Testors Silver at least a week to dry! (Still have a couple of bottles of the stuff with fifteen cents marked on the label) The hoist was painted yellow and in my vanity I decided to detail this one poor part! I added a hand crank, made from copper wire along with a hoist cable and hook made from sewing thread coated with super glue.

I highlighted the steps and railings with a little Rub-in-Buff silver, dry brushed other exposed parts with a little flat black and used a some black pastel in the exhaust areas.

Now remember I said there were four figures that came with the kit? Two of them are in protective suits and these were painted yellow with a satin over coating. Now here's a cool thing, the decal sheet has these tiny "Air Force" logos that go on the back of each of the exposure suits. By the way the original

Adams decal sheet had them as well. These figures are posed as if working on the model, one looks like he's holding an electrical line or hose which I added using a piece of copper wire painted black. The other two figures, a officer directing the work and a









technician running up the launch pad steps were painted as per the instructions. I spent about twelve hours building the launch pad bring total assembly time to about sixteen very enjoyable hours.

This was just plain fun to build. I know there's a lot of builders who go for extreme accuracy in their models however that can take a toll in the enjoyment of the hobby. Sometimes going back to basics and having a little fun is the right thing to do! Now that I feel recharged it's time for the RosePlane 1/72 Siemens Schuckert DDR-1 vacuform kit! Go ahead and Google it.....now that's gonna be an epic build!

In order to practice on something low-stress before I need to decal several dozen motorized and illuminated airliners, I picked up their 1/48th scale markings for the P-51C air racer "Thunderbird". Remember those snap-fit Pegasus kits we got from Bill years ago? Well, now I'll finally have a compelling reason to finish the P-51B model that's been lying about "almost done" all this time.

MosquitoCon updates are going on the website as soon as I get them. The countdown timer should be up this weekend. REMINDER: I may need someone to handle photography this year. If interested, please let me know at the meeting or email me.

Finally, I'm going to host a Primary and Secondary Colors Night this coming September. One of the things I really love about my job is that I get to use all of the bright colors that we often ignore on military models. So this contest will be for models of green and blue and purple and orange. The requirement is to use a primary or secondary shade as the predominate color in the scheme. You can do a firebomber, an air racer, a figure, a sci-fi kit, a car or truck, a ferry boat, fire truck. Basically anything with color. More details to come.
