

Airfix, Celebrating 50 Years of the Greatest Plastic Kits in the World, by Arthur Ward, published by Harper Collins.

This is a well-illustrated 195 page hard cover book covering the history of the iconic Airfix company up till 1999. It is a highly readable book, not like a collectors guide at all. It weaves the ups and downs of this company and how some of the models came to be.

The most striking thing about this book is the pictures of the various kits and their original boxes. This volume will bring back many memories and is one of my all-time favorites



Monogram Models by Thomas Graham, published by Schiffer Books

Since its beginning in Chicago in the Late 1940's Monogram plastic models of cars, ships, aircraft and spacecraft have been built by millions of hobbyists. This 160 page soft cover book has over 300 color pictures and covers all kits made between 1945 and 1986. It also contains a very valuable kit compendium with associated kit numbers.

It's a highly readable book that gives a complete history of the company, with particular emphasis on the various model designers and sculptors and some fascinating stories from the salesmen who put the kits on the hobby shop (remember those?) shelves.








**Remembering Revell Model Kits** by Thomas Graham, published by Schiffer Books.

Revell, a name we all grew up with! This 176 page soft cover book contains 540 color photos of the many ships, automobiles, tanks, aircraft and spacecraft kits that Revell produced from the early 1950's and well into the 1970's.

There are fascinating stories of the man, Lou Glaser who started Revell and his wife, Royal Glaser who successfully ran the company after his death. There are very detailed discussions on how various models were developed, discussions of the artists who brought the box art to life (Revell had the best box art!) along with a model kit index providing listing of the models produced and their variations. This is one of my all-time favorite books to read, just looking at the pictures brings back many happy memories.



Frog Model Aircraft 1932-1976, by Richard Lines, published by New Cavendish Books.

This is a massive, hard cover 272 page book containing 190 color and 720 black and white photos that discusses the history of Frog (Flies Right Off the Ground) Model Company. This is a very detailed history of Frog, written by Richard Lines, of Lines Brothers fame, the company that ran Frog for many years.

The book contains fascinating sections on pre-World War Two plastic kits under the Triang and Penguin brands as well as the Frog flying models. Complete, very detailed histories of all the models produced, their origins and commercial considerations that influenced their production are also included.



**Aurora Model Kits** by Thomas Graham, published by Schiffer Books

Aurora created model kits of all varieties from saying ships, sports cars, rockets, military and commercial aircraft, wildlife scenes and comic book heroes. They are very famous for their Hollywood monsters such as Frankenstein, Dracula and the Wolfman as well as my favorite "The Gullotine". This 175 page softcover book contains 450 color photos and describes every Aurora model made, and some that never went into,production. The book also covers much of their box top art and the artists who drew them. A great read about a great old company.








**La Gamme Heller Musee** by Jean-Christophe Carbonel, published by Histoire and Collections, a French publisher.

Ok, this 67 page soft cover book is written in French but its 102 color pictures will tell the story. As I'm French in family heritage and have worked for a French company, Avions Marcel Dassault, I can read, passably well, the French text.

This is not a history of Heller but rather the story of their Museum (Musee) Series of aircraft models that were issued between 1964 and 1967. We know some of these models as the Dewoitine 520. Bloch 152, Amiot 143 and the Liore 45 just to name a few of the 22 aircraft in this series. Basically the story goes like this; in 1964, Frog, the English company, issued a Dewoitine 520 and Morane Saulnier 406 in 1/72 scale. This caused an immediate hue and cry in French modeling magazines that an English company was making models of French aircraft. Why was no French company doing this? (It's a French thing, trust me, I know). Heller, up until that time had made mostly box scale models of cars and airplanes that were not particularly detailed. However the owner of Heller, Leo Jahiel, decided to take up the challenge and produce extremely detailed Museum quality 1/72 French aircraft models. Knowing his company did not have the expertise to produce such models, Jahile contacted Lou Glaser of Revell Models for advice. To make a long story short the result was the "Musee" series of 1/72 scale French aircraft. These models were very detailed and are still being produced to this day. Even though the book is written in French the pictures of the models and their associated box art will bring back some great memories.



**1973-2000, The Story of Matchbox Kits** by Jean-Christophe Carbonel, published by Histoire and Collections, a French publisher.

This book was brought to my attention by John, (RIP) at the old Avenel Hobby Shop. Dan Spera and I visited the shop one day and the book was immediately thrust into my hands by John who told me "You need this book". How right he was! This is a small 82 page soft cover book containing 150 color pictures of all Matchbox kits made between 1973 and 2000 and includes Revell reissues under the Matchbox brand. Also discussed is the Matchbox-AMT connection for car, truck and aircraft models. A concise kit list is also included Matchbox got much attention by modelers because of their odd between the wars subjects, especially with aircraft. Although molded in multicolored parts and aimed for the beginner modeler Matchbox kits were well detailed and built up into great models.





It should be noted that in 1979 Matchbox pioneered in developing the first 1/72 scale model of a large warship, the Flower class Corvette. Until that time only small patrol craft had been manufactured in that scale. This is a great little book! Thanks John!



At Models for Troops, we provide a 2-fold service to our United States military community, both active duty and retired. We support disabled and injured veterans through group builds and supplying model kits at multiple VA Hospitals. We also act as a Point of Contact for active duty personnel being deployed overseas through the IPMS-USA Support the Troops initiative.

Through your generous donations, we provide troops stationed in war-torn areas with packages containing plastic model kits of all scales and subject matter, sanding sticks, glues, trimmers, acrylic paints, brushes, and model building magazines for recreation. From August 2012 until December 2015, more than 3,000 lbs. (over 1 ton) of kits and building supplies have been distributed.

As a part of larger VA recreational therapy programs, we help veterans suffering from PTSD, TBI and other post combat related issues find a way to refocus the minds attention. Much like meditation, we have found that building plastic model kits is a great way to tie the veteran's past to a more positive present and future. Whether building a kit or just following the directions and diagrams, it is the process and not the finished model that is the greatest benefit. A little goes a long way.
