



Hawk Project Vanguard Satellite

I've noticed that when you get older and retire you do go through a second childhood. This was proven by the fact of my recent purchase of the Hawk Project Vanguard Satellite. I built the original model in 1960 for a second grade "show and tell". Seeing the model again, resplendent in its original box art was like seeing a long lost friend. It brought back pleasant memories of how my parents thought building this model would be very educational for me. Imagine parents today thinking building a model would be educational! It was purchased at the Woolworth store in Styertown Shopping Mall in Clifton New Jersey for 98 cents. (I think Mike Pavlo will be interested in this) I purchased this model from HobbyLink for \$11.96.

The original model was first issued by Hawk in 1958 and now has been reissued by a company called "Round 2 Models" who also reissue Lindberg, MPC, Polar Lights and AMT models. They also have a very nice web site, just Google "Round 2 Models" and you'll get there. Also a nice touch is the inclusion of a color catalog of all their models in each model box. Remember when all model manufacturers did this?

The kit has 22 parts molded in grey and clear plastic. A very nice display stand, not in the original 1958 model is now included. There are two very clear plastic upper and lower domes for the satellite body which allows for viewing of the interior. I found this interesting as the actual Vanguard satellite had a central interior column, very much like a frame, in which the various experiments





were to be placed. This is very well replicated in the model. The sphere of the satellite was made of aluminum, surrounded this column and was pressurized to protect the various experiments.



The instruction sheet is typical 1950's and with so few parts should not pose any problems for the builder. A nice feature is that on the reverse of the instructions is a short history of the Vanguard program along with some terrific drawings of the satellite which will be valuable in building an accurate model. Another nice feature of the Round 2 reissue is that there are several pictures of a completed Vanguard satellite on the bottom of the model box. This model was built by Mat Irvine a spacecraft modeler and author of "Creating Space, The Story of the Space Age Told by Models". (Might have to get that book) When you combine these pictures with the drawings on the reverse of the instructions you'll have some very good references to build a very accurate model.

The decal sheet looks well printed and contains the names of the mysterious experiments carried by Vanguard such as "Ionization Chamber", Data Coding Device" and "Cosmic Ray Analyzer". Don't you just love 1950s technology?

All in all this looks like a great build. I think as soon as I'm finished building the Airfix new tool 1/72 Gloster Gladiator (more on that next month) this is next up on the bench. Since I'm 62 going on 12 it's time to be a kid again!



I'll bring the Vanguard model to the July meeting and am looking forward to seeing everybody then. Now go do something useful like building a model!

Tool Glimpse

Over the years I've spent an insane amount of time setting up lighting at my workbench. Different fixtures mounted on the ceiling, walls, and free standing, holding bulbs of, initially, daylight corrected incandescents, then CFL's, and now I'm switching to the new daylight corrected LED bulbs. The new LED bulbs aren't inexpensive, the last 100w I bought was \$40, but it's perfectly balanced for color, generates no heat, and will last the rest of my life.

One issue that's always cropped up, though, no matter how many bulbs I have and where they're placed, is shadow. No matter where you're working, you lean in close to a project and BAM, suddenly you've got a big shadow from your head (and for some of us, that can be a BIG shadow!). Enter the Quasar LS.



When I first saw this I thought it a gimmick.

I have the old Optivisor flashlight attachment that I never used, as it didn't put out enough light. The Quasar LS, though, with its 6 high intensity LEDs promised more and even light. The Quasar comes with everything you need to get it working, except for a small screwdriver. Using the existing mounting holes for the magnifier plate, and a Velcro strap for the battery box, the assembly installs in mere minutes. When I first tried it I believe my exact words, said aloud, were "Holy crap, that's a lot of light!" It's not like shining a spotlight on your work, but it's a good amount of light, aimed right where you're looking, and it completely eliminates shadows.



It's not perfect as the battery pack does add a bit of weight to your Optivisor, but not an unwieldy amount. The power switch can also be tricky to find when it's on your head. That's about it, though. I spent around \$30 for my Quasar LS and can't recommend it enough. It's such a great idea that I fully expect Optivisor to start incorporating something like this into their visors in the future (unless they already have and I missed the product announcement).

Tonight Joe Smith presented me with a very generous check from the membership and officers of NJIPMS, to help defray the costs incurred by my daughters illness. I wanted to make a guest appearance in the newsletter to say "thank you", on behalf of myself and my family.

Your kindness and generosity is very much appreciated! Thank you, thank you!

To bring everyone up to speed, my daughter (she turned 9 in June) was diagnosed with a type of brain tumor called a glioma on March 19, 2015. The three months since then have been a rollercoaster ride of churning emotions and learning more than I ever wanted to know about gliomas, radiation and chemotherapy.

She has endured 6 weeks of radiation and chemotherapy, taking an experimental oral medicine designed to slow the growth of the tumor and make it more susceptible to the radiation. She finished the radiation just after Memorial Day, and had a follow up MRI in mid-June. We were cautioned by the Doctors not to expect much of a change with this first MRI. In fact we were told that not only would it probably not have shrunk, but it may have enlarged due to radiation induced swelling.

Well, the good news is that Keira's tumor - while still there - has shrunk. It's shrunk 4mm (about 12%) from top to bottom and 2mm (about 10%) from side to side. The docs said they usually don't see this type of progress, especially for the first, post-radiation MRI.

We met with the oncology team again earlier this week, where we decided to start her on a new chemo drug next week. The Doctors are very happy with her progress. I am encouraged by her progress, and while I firmly believe that she will beat this, we aren't out of the woods yet.

Please continue to keep her in your thoughts and prayers. My deepest thanks to all of you, for thinking of her and for your generosity. It means the world to me. I hope to see all of you again sometime down the road. Until then, I wish you all the best. ~ **Martin**
