

KASKR-2 Autogyro


This is my build of the Amodel 1/72nd Scale KASKR-2 Autogyro. A few years ago I built the KASKR-1, also by Amodel, and enjoyed the build so much that I decided to build the improved version. Both KASKR autogyro were designed by Nikolay Kamov and Nikolay Skrzhinsky who later became prominent helicopter designers. In case you're wondering the designation "KASKR" derives from the first few initials of the designers last name.

The build was pretty straight forward. I cut out and posed the flight controls for a little interest and to illustrate how the aircraft was actually controlled . The rotor supplied only lift with conventional aileron, elevator and rudder for directional control. The stub wings supplied minimal lift. The rotor could be spun up prior to flight through a drive shaft and clutch arrangement. This allowed the aircraft to "jump" up a few feet while the conventional propeller pulled the aircraft forward.




The cockpit was not well detailed so I scratch built most of the internal structure with Evergreen rod and strip stock. Cockpit seats and control sticks came from the spares box. Seatbelts were made from thin sheet lead cut into strips and painted brown. The buckles were picked out in silver. Cockpit instrument panel were made from scrap plastic with the instruments from a spare decal sheet.

The rotor was a very interesting build as the original was made from wood with fabric covering. I painted the rotor Testors 4722 Radome Tan and once dry light brown pastel was rubbed over the blades to highlight the rib detail. The rotor hub was painted Tamiya XF-16 Aluminum.



The fuselage was a little difficult to close but judicious use of some clamps did the trick. The rotor mast was constructed separately by using a small jig that duplicated the mating surfaces on the fuselage. An interesting item on the rotor mast were the two externally mounted instruments that were viewed by the pilot. These were two tachometers, one for rotor RPM and the other for engine RPM. These instruments were critical for proper operation of the aircraft. These instruments were made from Evergreen rod stock and painted black with copper wire used for the leads. The instrument faces came from a Grant decal sheet.


With the fuselage complete and the rotor mast attached it was time for the ski landing gear. The skis were kit supplied but the attach brackets were scratch built from steel wire. The skis were made of wood as was the center nose over guard and propeller. The wood was simulated by painting the parts Tamiya XF-15 Flesh, then streaked with Tamiya XF-79 Deck Brown followed by a coating of Tamiya X-26 Clear Orange to bring out the wood grain and gloss finish of the original parts. The bungee cords for the center nose over guard and landing gear cross supports was made from black thread soaked in super glue followed by Micro flat finish.



Rigging was done using stretched sprue. The rotor counterweights on the outboard rigging was simulated by placing thick black paint on the rigging with a tooth pick. These counterweights acted as a crude vibration damper. Stretched sprue was also used for flight control rigging.

The KASKR was painted Tamiya XF-26 Deep Green with the metal portions Tamiya XF-16 Flat Aluminum. The aircraft undersides were painted Polly Scale 505226 USSR Undersides Blue. Weathering was done with a mixture of green, black and gray pastels plus Rub-N-Buff Silver. The aircraft carried no markings so no decals were needed.

For reference I used Soviet Autogyros 1929-1942 by Mikhail Maslov, published by Helion and



Company. This is an excellent softcover book with extensive color profiles and fabulous line It's available from Amazon for about \$20 and is highly recommended.

This was a very interesting and fun three week build. Thanks for reading, hope to be at the November "Russian Night" meeting. Now get down to your bench and build something!
