A Biplane with drop tanks?

Just completed the RS 1/72nd scale model of the Arado Ar65. This aircraft was originally used as a training aircraft however, during WWII it was also used as a night harassment aircraft and to tow gliders. I chose to model the glider towing version as it has these neat looking external fuel tanks mounted under the upper wing. This was a field modification that gave the aircraft greater range when towing gliders. I really liked how they mounted the fuel lines running from the tanks and into the fuselage along with their associated support struts. To my FAA friends: I'd "field approve" this alteration in a heartbeat!



This was pretty much straight forward build, mostly out of the box. I did have to scratch build the interplane "N" struts as the kit supplied ones were too short. These were made from Contrail strut stock. The external tank fuel lines were made from thin nickel coated copper wire. The fuel line support struts were also made from Contrail strut stock. The tanks along with their mounts were resin parts supplied with the kit.

I use Aleens's Tacky Glue to position the upper wings. It is very thick and slow drying which is great for aligning the upper wing. If a mistake is made the glue is easily removed with water. I start from the cabane struts, the small struts that connect the top wing to the fuselage. I apply just a drop of the glue to the tip of each strut, attach and align the wing and let dry. If the alignment is good I then go to the interplane struts, that's the struts that attach the bottom and top wings and tack them in place. Once final alignment is achieved the strut join areas are secured with super glue applied with a toothpick and the wings are done.

Polly Scale 505033 white paint was used throughout with the exception of the yellow identification markings which is Tamiya XF-3 Yellow. These aircraft were heavily used and were extremely weathered. For weathering effects I used a mixture of black and dark gray green pastels with Rub-N-Buff silver for the metal portions. Stretched sprue was used for the rigging. Kit supplied decals were used.



Oh, those small axle extensions you see coming off the landing gear wheels are used for

attaching skis for winter use.

This was a very enjoyable four week build of a very interesting aircraft. One of my friends Mike Witkowski always jokes with me when he sees one of my biplane builds by asking where's the extrrnal stores like fuel tanks, and rockets. Well here's the tanks Mike, I'll start looking into rockets and missiles soon. I won't make it to the February meeting but will be there for the March "Nostalgia Night". Now be productive and get working on that build that's been sitting on your bench.



John Bucholz has a paint report.

Vallejo Hobby Paint-Good stuff in a big can!

I purchased this paint at the last Mosquitocon but I never got around to the project I was going to use it on. With the 1/72 armor group build on my bench I decided to test this product on a German halftrack. VALLEJO hobby paint comes in a very large 400ml can (for comparison Tamiya spray cans are 100ml). They also include two spray nozzles-one for fine work and one for larger area coverage. I used the fine spray nozzle as a 1/72 scale kit has a lot of fine lines and small rivets. As a test I sprayed multiple coats and even applied them in a heavier than usual manner. The paint snuggled down into all the recessed detail and all rivets were clearly visible. The paint dried to a nice Matt sheen and the surface was as smooth as an airbrush finish. There was no noticeable odor and the paint was dry to the touch in about 10 minutes. The only slight issue I had was with the color of the Panzer Yellow which seemed to be a bit too green. This was easily corrected by applying a wash of Gunze Sangyo H403 Dark Yellow after the Vallejo paint had dried for 24 hours. In summary I think that this product is a great addition to the VALLEJO line of paint. You can really attain an airbrush-like finish from a can and with a lot less prep and clean-up.


