SOVA-M GENERAL AVIATION GA43

The first half of the 1930's was a time of incredibly fast development in aviation. Metallic construction, soundproofing, toilets and washrooms rapidly replaced wood and fabric. There was also a brief phase of popularity for single-engine 'state of the art' rapid airliners such as the General Aviation GA43 or the better-known Vultee V1. These were rapidly overtaken by twin engine types, not the least because of safety concerns.

The General Aviation GA43 is sometimes called the Clark GA43 because of its designer, Virginius Clark. General Aviation changed owners several times during this airplane's brief production run, and had become North American Aviation before it was over; the GA43 therefore became the first plane produced by this illustrious company. It was a thoroughly modern plane that flew with a pilot, copilot, stewardess and ten passengers. There was a certain 'Art Deco 'feel about its appearance , somewhat like Flash Gordon's rocket! This 1/72 kit was recently put out by Sova-M . This name may not be familiar to you, but it is the same company as A model and Eastern Express. I have become convinced that they keep on changing their branding and nominal country of origin to accommodate for current sanctions and import duties. Nominally, they are now from the Ukraine. More power to them!



The GA43 is a competent ki, with assembly being simple and hassle-free .Very nice molding is evident in small parts such as the landing gear and cockpit furnishings . There are no accommodations provided for the passenger cabin, which is fine as they would be invisible if they were there.

Special mention must be made of the large, single piece clear cockpit. It is beautifully molded and fits well; this is just as well as it sits so prominently on top of the fuselage. Masks are provided for it.

There is a very small fret of photo-etch: pushrods for the engine, and beautiful scissors for the landing gear legs; these were so delicate that I wasn't able to use them, and instead made some up from plastic scrap.

Painting was a breeze. I began with a couple of coats of Mr Surfacer 1000 spray primer to get rid of eventual rough spots. That being done, I gave my GA43 an overall silver finish with Design Studios's Brilliant Silver dried flower-safe spray paint. I am thankful to Mr Mike Terre for the recommendation; you can find this at Michael's.

The cockpit interior was painted blue-grey and the pilots' seats dark blue - just a guess as I could find no guidance it this. Seat belts were my usual: strips of yellowed newsprint. The decals provided are of excellent quality, with two choices being offered: Japanese or Manchuria . They lay down as well as they look, but require some care as they are prone to folding over. Regrettably, the small winged GA logos are not handed.

A few small details were added: an airspeed probe, two sets of landing lights, wingtip position lights and 'pop-up landing gear position indicators on top of the wings. The latter are pieces of thin metal wire planted into small holes and painted red. Windows were made using Testor's clear parts glue and window maker.

As usual, I finished off my model with a coat of satin varnish from a Tamiya spray can. This was an enjoyable and relatively simple project, and also a reminder of how much of aviation's past remains unexplored.

And the winner of a \$25 Micro-Mark voucher was John Bucholz' rotating Russian Army Beauties!


There were other models also on display.

Greg Voronin built Hobby Boss'1/48 ME-262 with a conversion for the 30 mm cannon.




Lukas Spitz-Chapman showed a nice dio-rama of 1/35 Meng Jagdpanther with Alpne figures and a scratch-built house. Nice.
