Here's a build from our Mad Doctor-DR. SIMON!!

Just like me, many of you guys don't live in the past; we just happen to have spent a lot of time there ...And some of you will remember those cheap AOSHIMA kits, sold as such or by Brooklyn's own Universal Powermaster Company .I recently wrote up my build of two of their Brewster Buffaloes .It was a relatively satisfactory experience but I remembered that when I first built one, circa 1967, I'd noticed it to be more user-friendly than Aoshima's other kits .

So, as an experiment, I decided to build a couple of other 1/72 Aoshima kits of that vintage: the C6N Myrt, A7M Sam, E16A Paul, E15K Norm and the M6A1 Seiran (not identified before VJ Day, it never got an Allied code name).



I am not going to bore you with the details of each of these constructions .In each case , what you got was a minimum of parts and a basic shape .Scale doesn't seem to be quite to 1/72 standard : the "Paul" is definitely smaller , and the "Norm" larger ."Action Features" such as moving ailerons and folding wings are present on some kits, and not others . The C6N has folding wings ; in real life it did not have those .And moving surfaces are not even represented on some of these models .But that's OK : that's why we have putty, abrasives and all sorts of carving tools! Trailing edges are predictably not thin, and quite a few parts such as propellers do well with some gentle reshaping. On the upside, the cockpits are not all that bad at all ;interiors are completely absent, but I've dressed them all up courtesy of my spares box.

The single least pleasant aspect of building these dinosaurs is actually their plastic: it is notably hard ,which makes re-shaping and smoothing all those grapefruit-sized rivets a chore.

I built these five kits to "contractor grade", and painted them all in IJN green and ash gray ,with minimal added detailing :sewing pins for antennae and pitot tubes,position lights etc...Drop tanks from the spares box were found for the C6N and A7M. The decals used were mostly the 60 year old ones that came with the kits: they worked like a charm .Codes were obtained from my stash of decals.

I'm actually quite happy with how these kits turned out,but I still remember the frustration that they gave me the first time around, when LBJ was president .Some of you may remember what tools we had back then: double-edged razor blades or Stanley blades,a pocket knife, 150 and 200 grit sandpaper and tube glue . When I began using filler, I'd use household spackle,wood putty or Elmer's glue.And, definitely, definitely, no nice fine-tipped cutting pliers...Given these means, I still would find these kits to real b-ll busters!



What a cool concept! Thanks Doc!
